The Royal Canadian College of Organists (RCCO) Halifax presents its annual Christmas Carolfest, Monday, December 4, 7:00pm at the Cathedral Church of All Saints, 1330 Cathedral Lane, Halifax. Open to the public. Freewill Offering.

As part of the Commemoration of the Halifax Explosion - December 7th, 10AM-12 noon Homelessness and Hunger Symposium – St. Mark's Anglican Church. Some ideas on the origins of social work concepts help and relief guidelines and ideas that that began in 1917 in the aftermath of the explosion are being considered. We will then take a look at how are methods and tactics have changed, if at all, and what are today's needs. This will be set up as a panel with reps from places like Shelter Nova Scotia, Feed Nova Scotia with Wendy Keen as moderator. Modest lunch follows: a very basic soup and roll or bread along the theme of what type of food would have been given as aid in 1917. St. Mark's original building was destroyed in

the explosion and the rebuild was completed in 1921. The church has a strong connection to north end Halifax, an area so profoundly affected by the explosion.
